
O God of abundant compassion, our souls thirst for you, like a dry and waterless land. Flood our hearts with the torrents of your love.

Professional Learning in Religious Education


St Mary's is committed to providing a rich Catholic curriculum to the students. A critical component of making this possible is the ongoing professional development of staff in Religious Education.

Dear parents and carers,

With this year's NAPLAN Assessments commencing for our Years 3 and 5 students on Wednesday next week, assessment is very much on our minds and prevalent in the media..

Last year at St Mary's we designed a detailed assessment plan from K-6 to monitor student growth and ensure our students' needs are identified and catered for. We regularly revise our Assessment Schedule to ensure that it best captures what we need to know about where our students are placed. This schedule has several tiers to it... that is, assessments that are regularly undertaken by classroom teachers, by Learning Support teachers or external providers as necessary. We also use a whole suite of assessments from ACER (Australian Council of Educational Research) as well as the University of NSW assessments.

The information that we gain from these assessments help us to track student growth as well as designing learning that is at a 'just right' level for the students. After all there is no gain in teaching content and skills that are either too easy or too hard! Our students are guided to set learning goals for themselves based on the feedback that our assessment schedule provides. At the parent/ carer/teacher/child three way interviews in Week 9 (described to you in last week's newsletter), much of this information will be shared with you.

NAPLAN is another assessment tool to support our students' learning and track how we are travelling as a school. The way NAPLAN is being reported will differ this year and it is hoped that the information it yields will be more accessible.

Next week i will send this letter to our Years 3 and 5 students. It is a letter that has been circulating on Facebook for a while (I couldn't locate the original source)., and I think it contains an important message for us all to hold onto.

"Just remember, the people who design and report on NAPLAN don't know that some of you love to sing, are good at drawing or can teach a new skill to others.

They have not seen the way that some of you can dance with grace or speak confidently to a large group. They do not know that your friends count on you to be there for them when they are sad. They don't know that you are amazing at sport or that you help your Mum or Dad or that you play with your little brother, sister or cousins. They do not know that you are caring, thoughtful and try to do your best every day because these are attributes that cannot be tested.

NAPLAN will tell you how did on the day of the test but it doesn't say everything about you as a person. NAPLAN can't tell you how you have improved in an area you have been working on. It won't tell you how much you brighten your teacher's day just by being in the classroom, NAPLAN will definitely not tell you how special you are.

So come to school on the NAPLAN days ready to do your best and remember there is no one way to 'test' all of the wonderful things that make you, YOU!"

We cannot wait to go to James Sheahan. It will be awesome!



NAPLAN 2023

Year 3 and 5 NAPLAN schedule is 15th - 27th March.

Students will need to bring in their headphones and chromebooks (fully charged) each day during this period. It would be worthwhile to check in with your child that their headphones are working correctly and we cannot share these.

Students sit four tests: Writing, Reading, Conventions of Language and Numeracy. Please read the NAPLAN information for parents brochure in this newsletter.

NAPLAN Information for parents and carers 2023

Why do students do NAPLAN?

NAPLAN is a national literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students have the opportunity to undertake.

As students progress through their school years, it's important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy.

NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national standards and over time.

NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process. It doesn't replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance, but it can provide teachers with additional information about students' educational progress.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

Your child will do the NAPLAN tests online

Schools have transitioned from paper-based to computer-based assessments. All Year 3 students will continue to complete the writing assessment on paper.

Online NAPLAN tests provide more precise results and are more engaging for students. One of the main benefits is tailored (or adaptive) testing, where the test presents questions which may be more or less difficult depending on a student's responses.

Tailored testing allows a wider range of student abilities to be assessed and measures student achievement more precisely. A student's overall NAPLAN result is based on both the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions challenging; they may be taking a more complex test pathway.

What does NAPLAN assess?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum.

Students sit assessments in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. The questions assess content linked to the Australian Curriculum: English and Mathematics.

All government and non-government education authorities contribute to the development of NAPLAN test materials.

Participation in NAPLAN

NAPLAN is for everyone. ACARA supports inclusive testing so all students have the opportunity to participate in the national assessment program.

Adjustments are available for students with disability who have diverse functional abilities and needs.

Schools should work with parents/carers and students to identify, on a case-by-case basis, reasonable adjustments required for individual students with disability to access NAPLAN. Adjustments should reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments.

To help inform these decisions, you may consult the NAPLAN public demonstration site, the Guide for schools to assist students with disability to access NAPLAN, or our series of videos where parents/carers, teachers and students share their experiences in using NAPLAN adjustments.

In exceptional circumstances, a student with a disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background, may be granted a formal exemption.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on adjustments for students with disability or the process required to gain a formal exemption.





What if my child is absent from school on NAPLAN days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule.

What if my school is closed on NAPLAN days?

Schools with compelling reasons may be given permission to schedule tests after the 9-day test window.

What can I do to support my child?

Students are not expected to study for NAPLAN. You can support your child by reassuring them that NAPLAN is a part of their school program and reminding them to simply do their best. Some familiarisation and explanation of NAPLAN is useful to help students understand and be comfortable with the format of the tests. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of services by coaching providers.

NAPLAN timetable

The NAPLAN test window is 9 days. This is to accommodate schools that may have fewer devices.

The NAPLAN test window starts on Wednesday 15 March and finishes on Monday 27 March 2023. Schools are advised to schedule the tests as soon as possible within the testing window, prioritising the first week.

How is my child's performance reported?

Individual student performance is shown on a national achievement scale for each assessment. This scale indicates whether the student is meeting expectations for the literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year level.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be provided by your child's school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your child's school.

How are NAPLAN results used?

- Students and parents/carers may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to help identify students who need greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas of need to improve teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review the effectiveness of programs and support offered to schools.
- The community can see information about the performance of schools over time at myschool.edu.au.


Children are asked to wear their sports uniform, joggers, and school hat on this day. Please ensure your child also has a labeled drink bottle as well.

School fee concessions for Health Care Card and Pensioner Concession Card Holders

The Catholic Education Diocese of Bathurst offer a fee concession to assist low income families experiencing financial hardship.

The new concession is available to eligible Health Care Card (HCC) or Pensioner Concession Card (PCC) holders in 2023.

Eligible families will receive a 30 per cent concession to reduce the Single School Fee and Capital Works Levy.

To be eligible, the parent or carer must hold an eligible and current card and be responsible for the payment of school fees. The HCC or PCC concession is applied after applying the sibling discount.

The parent or carer must also be willing to enter into a regular direct debit payment plan to pay the remaining fees by the end of the year. Should circumstances arise where additional fee relief is needed, the normal fee concession application process is available at your school.

Parent or carers may apply directly to the school for a HCC or PCC concession by completing a simple application form and providing their card with the appropriate code to the school. A small number of cards may not be eligible for the concession.

Bishop Michael McKenna strongly urges families to remember that no child will be denied a Catholic school education due to financial hardship.

If you are finding it difficult to pay your family's schools fees, please contact your school principal to access assistance.



WHAT TO DO WHEN.....

Your child is absent from school

Parents have seven days to provide an explanation please enter into this into the Compass Portal

Your child is going to an appointment during school hours

Parents have to sign the child out of school on the Compass Portal in the front office. Office staff will arrange for your child to meet parents at the office. Parents are not permitted to enter the classroom. A Leave Pass will be issued to the parent taking the child to the appointment.

Your child arrives late to school

Parents are required to escort their child to the front office. Parents are to complete a Late to School Notice on the Compass Portal. The child takes the notice to the class. Parents are not permitted to enter the classroom.

All absenteeism are recorded on the Class Roll which is a legal and binding document. The Principal is only permitted to grant 15 days Leave per year per child. This does not include absenteeism due to sickness. Any child requiring more than 10 days' leave must apply for an exemption through the school office.

UNIFORM

Uniform expectations

The school uniform is a distinguishing symbol of belonging to St Mary's Catholic Primary School and it is expected that students wear it with pride at all times. The assistance of parents and staff is sought in maintaining a high standard of dress and presentation by all students.

Students not wearing the correct or incomplete uniform are required to provide a note from a parent or carer giving reasons why and letting us know when the uniform will be corrected.

If students continually choose to wear the incorrect uniform or ignore our dress code a parent meeting will be requested.

In addition to the uniform we ask that:

- Students maintain acceptable hairstyles. Extremes of hairstyle are not permitted, including rat's tails, mohawks, coloured hair and haircuts or undercuts less than a 'two 'and stripes etc shaved into their head. Hair gel is to be kept to a minimum. Hair that is collar length or longer is to be tied back with a maroon, brown or dark blue ribbon.
- No coloured tights with the girls dress
- Bracelets, bangles, necklaces or anklets are not worn, with the exception of a religious medal on a fine chain that may be tucked into the uniform.
- One small signet ring is worn.
- Nail polish is not worn.
- One set of earrings is permitted. Plain sleepers or plain studs only.

Students who wear inappropriate accessories will be asked to remove such items, take them to the office and collect them at the end of the day to take home.

Dear Parents/Carers,

We have had a confirmed case of Chicken Pox at St Mary's Primary School in Year 1.

Please see the information below on how to identify Chicken Pox.

What is Chickenpox?

- Chickenpox is a viral illness caused by the herpes zoster virus (also known as the Varicella-Zoster virus)
- In children it usually causes a relatively mild illness.
- Chickenpox in adults and immunosuppressed people can be severe.
- Infection in pregnancy can cause foetal malformations, skin scarring, and other problems in the baby.
- Before routine vaccination began in November 2005, chickenpox was a very common illness. The incidence of chickenpox appears to have decreased as more people receive the vaccine.


What are the symptoms?

- Chickenpox begins with a sudden onset of slight fever, runny nose, feeling generally unwell and a skin rash.
- The rash usually begins as small lumps that turn into blisters and then scabs.
- The rash appears over three to four days. At any one time, the lesions of the rash vary in stages of development.
- Symptoms usually occur two weeks after exposure to the virus.
- Most people recover without complications, but sometimes the infection can lead to serious complications, such as pneumonia and inflammation of the brain. Rarely, the infection can be fatal.

How is it spread?

- Early in the illness, the virus is spread by coughing.
- Later in the illness, the virus is spread by direct contact with the fluid in the blisters.
- The infection is highly contagious to people who have never had chickenpox or who have not been immunised.
- People are infectious from one or two days before the rash appears (that is, during the runny nose phase) and up to five days after (when the blisters have formed crusts or scabs)
- Chickenpox infection triggers an immune response and people rarely get chickenpox twice.

HAND HYGIENE

Hand Hygiene is one very effective way to control the spread of infection and germs. Always wash your hands with soap and water, or using an alcohol based hand rub.

HEAD LICE

The child will need to be sent home immediately if head lice are detected.

Not excluded if effective treatment begins before the next day at the education or care service.

COLDS & FLU

Exclude until person is well.

Many viruses have similar symptoms, including gastro and COVID-19. If your child is unwell you must keep them home and get them to take a rapid antigen or PCR test to make sure they don't have COVID-19.

Gastro normally begins with vomiting. Children then develop frequent diarrhoea. Often children may have tummy pain and fever, some children may have a runny nose, or a sore throat (usually caused by vomiting or dehydration).

DIARRHOEA

Exclude until there has not been a loose bowel movement for 48 hours.

CONJUNCTIVITIS

Exclude until discharge from the eyes has stopped, unless a Doctor has diagnosed non-infectious Conjunctivitis


VOMITING

Exclude until there has been no vomiting for 48 hours

HAND FOOT & MOUTH DISEASE

Exclude until all blisters have dried.
